WINTER is always a stern reminder of the needs of the poor.

The present season, it is true, has been unusually mild up to this for each year of the year.

But it would be absurd to count on a lengthy continuance of weather like that of the month just drawing to a close.

Rigorous days and nights are almost certain to strike for us during the next few months.

And it is against such trying times some adequate provision must be made on behalf of the distressed and less well-to-do among us.

We are glad to learn, therefore, that the annual public meeting in aid of the Limerick Fuel and Blanket Fund will be held in the Town Hall to-morrow at 4 o'clock p.m.

The promoters of that most deserving charity do an immense lot of good year after year in helping the poor of the city and making their lot brighter and happier than it would otherwise be.

And never, it is safe to say, were their efforts more needed than at the present time, and we sincerely trust their praiseworthy endeavours will get the largest possible help and cooperation of charitable citizens of all classes.

Unemployment in our midst is terrifically high at the moment, and, consequently, the amount of hardship to be relieved is much greater than ever.

Hence the necessity for a more general and generous response to the appeal to be made from the public meeting to be held in the Town Hall to-morrow.

The poor, it is said, will always have with us, and while that remains the case there is a duty on all who can do so to help their less fortunate brethren.

It is all very well to say there is enough in the world to go round to all if properly distributed, but the poor can find little comfort in pondering on the possibilities underlying such a statement.

MAYOR OF LIMERICK
APPEALS TO AMERICA
FOR LOAN OF TWENTY
MILLION DOLLARS
On Behalf of Irish Republic

What the Money is Needed For
The following is a copy of an appeal issued to the people of the United States by Mr. S.M. O'Mera, Mayor of Limerick, American Agent of the Finance Department of the Irish Republic:

A CHINA—in the year 1920 a loan of more than a million dollars was successfully floated in this country by the Irish Republic.

Within a few days I shall render you an account of this money and I desire to you in some detail the manner in which it was expended.

I have now to inform you that I have been commissioned by Mr. Michael Gilliam, Minister of Finance of the Irish Republic, to come to the United States as Financial Agent for the purpose of raising a loan of twenty million dollars. This, the second external loan of the Irish Republic, was fully authorized by the Irish Republic, August 26, 1921.

England, too, has sent her financial agent here to arrange the loans which your country has made to her, loans of not less than five billions of dollars—loans which your people are proud to make. I desire to share this same privilege and share the same honor.

Dall Eireann, at its meeting of August 17th, in passing a resolution of thanks to the American people, promised, on behalf of the Irish Nation, to redeem the bond certificate of the first loan in due season. To fulfill this pledge and to redeem also this present loan would be an easy task for a free Ireland, for Ireland's annual revenue is two hundred and fifty million dollars.

Permit me briefly to indicate to you the purpose for which this second loan is needed. It is required to carry out the first steps of the program of reconstruction which we have adopted in this country. To do this we must have funds to reconstruct the country, to rebuild our cities and to develop our resources.

We need also to repair the ravages of war, built up our industries and to develop our agriculture. In a word, we need to carry out the purpose for which the first loan was launched, namely, to enable the Republic of Ireland to continue to function, to preserve its integrity, and to achieve its Recognition.

It is carrying out the order of my Government that I come to the first steps of this program. I have asked Mr. Anthony Burnett to accept, as state chairman, the responsibility for the loan in Washington. I have placed the quota of the loan at one hundred thousand dollars—a large figure, but based on confidence of what I have found in Washington of sympathy, friendship, and admiration for the people of Ireland in their struggle.

These are no idle words; the issue is too grave; the cause too sacred to trifling with unmet phrases.

Arrangements for Monday's
Function

President de Valera was accorded a most enthusiastic reception on his arrival at Limerick last night, on route to Banke in connection with his tour through Clare and Galway.

At least a couple of hours before the train scheduled for the arrival of the train crowds had assembled in the vicinity of the railway terminus and a mass of sympathizers lined the platform to welcome the arrival of the Irish Republic's leader.

The Mid-Limerick Brigade Staff, I.R.A., was on the platform to welcome President de Valera and a guard of honour, consisting of "Volunteers", kept a passage between the President and the train during his stay at the station, which he took some light refreshment during his short stay of less than ten minutes.

Arrival at Ennis
All Clare was represented at Banke in the huge crowd that assembled to welcome Mr. de Valera to his constituency. Volunteers were drawn up at the station in companies under Commandant B. Brennan, behind them being a mass of enthusiastic people, including priests from all parts of the county.

Mr. de Valera, who visited important centres in Mid-Clare to-day, and will visit other parts of the county and South Galway and Galway city between the 1st and 5th inst. will arrive in Limerick by motor from Ennis on Monday forenoon. On the afternoon of the same day he will be presented with the Freedom of the City in the Theatre Royal.

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Later Arrangements
According to latest arrangements Mr. de Valera will receive the Freedom of the City at 8 o'clock, and the weekly half-holiday will be observed from Thursday to Monday. A reception committee, consisting of Corporation representatives, Catholic clergy, the Parliamentary representatives (Aldermen M.P. O'Connell and Mrs. O'Connell), the City and Labour organizations, and other public bodies, have been formed to make arrangements in connection with the function.

PEACE OUTLOOK
DECIDEDLY OPTIMISTIC
"Fresh Proposals" Mentioned

Sir James Craig declared in Belfast yesterday that he was authorized by Mr. Lloyd George to state that on Tuesday next the negotiations will have come to an end, or "Ulster" will be presented with new proposals.

The British and Irish delegates again discussed the position yesterday, and the three British newspapers sponsor reports which state that fresh proposals approaching the problem from a new angle were put forward by Mr. Lloyd George.

The most hopeful thing that can be said of the Irish situation (says the "Freeman" representative) in a message from London this morning is that the Peace Negotiations have not been shelved, and that Sir James Craig and his colleagues have tried to kill all prospects of a settlement between Ireland and this country by refusing to accept the British Government's proposal for an All-Ireland Parliament.
