

Limerick freemen

THE conferring of the Freedom of the City this afternoon on President de Valera and Alderman Mrs Tom Cierke added two distinguished names to Limerick's roll of freemen.

That roll constitutes a remarkable list of notabilities, and to-day's function recalls some interesting fasts in connection with it.

It was Isaac Bath, for some time Member of Parliament for Limerick Oity, who was responsible for the passing of the. " Municipal Privileges (Ireland) Act, 1876," by which power is vasted in Manieipal Oorporations to confer the honorary Freedom of the City on distinguished persons or persons of high degree.

By a happy coincidence Issue Butt himself NOTABLE BECEPTION was the first on whom the honoar of the Free dom of Limerick was conferred. That was on the let of January, 1877.

Bestdes being the first to receive the honorary Freedom of Limerick, lease Bust had the distinction of being the first to receive such an bonour in Ireland; Limerick being the first Itieh elty to take advantage of the new

Many distinguished names have been added to the roll since the time of Isana Bast.

Parnell was granted the Freedom of the City in 1880. Two years later, on the 13th June. 1982, Mishael Davits was voted an Henorary Freeman, but it was not until April 24 th, 1884 that he reselved the honour and signed the reli-On the same pecasion Mr Obarles Dawson, who was a Limerick man, and who was then Lord Mayor of Dablin and MP for Oarlow, was enrolled a Freeman.

Gladstone wri granted the bonorary Freedom of Limerick "In recognition of his gross and distinguished services in the sames of Belf. Covernment for Iraland."

Mr William O Brien comes next on the list; and in January, 1868, the Breedom was voted to the Marquie of Ripon and Mr John (now Lord) Moriay.

Oardinal Logue and Right Rev James Corbest, DD (a Limerick man who became Bishop of Sale, Asstralia), are amongs the church dignitories who figure in the lies.

Sir Thomas Myies, the distinguished surgeen; Lady Aberdeen, and Miss Masde Goone are also in the ro!! of Freemen of Limerick.

Towards the end of 1900 the Freedom of the Ony was voted to President Kinger, but as Kenger never visited this country the presents. tion seramony navar took place.

SCIENCE NOTES AND NEWS.

A MINIATURE UNIVERSE. A nevel and original apparatus for the Budy of the secrets of the heavens has been Bevised by the famous Norwegian physicist, Dr. Mirkeland, of Christiania, who has coma universe in miniature for the pur-Paris Timps, Dr. Birkeland believes there as simportant role in the stellar universe. Many things remain confused in the minds of shypteists, but they feel that these electrical shamomena are responsible for the illumination of the tail of comets, the draperies of the aurora borealis, and that they influence the magnetic storms which in the polar regions "Dr. Birkeland relies for his results more

sa experiment than on scientific theories. To this end he built his miniature universe, of which he himself is the master. This universe has a capacity of seventy litres, and is a huge riese bell into which he can introduce various sees, and in which he can maintain any degree of vacuum he prefers. In the centre of it is a planet of eight centimetres diameter, which Dr. Birkeland calls the 'terrella,' and is actually a copper sphere containing as induction-coll, which can be stimulated by electric currents to reproduce on the "terrella" the equivalent of terrestrial magnetism. On the side is a metallic disc, generator of electrons, which represents the

"By sending electrical discharges through the interior of the hell, one produces luminone evidences that vary greatly with the rare-Scation of the gas, the intensity of the elec-Srical discharges, and the inductivity of the sentral globe. As long ago as 1908 Dr. Birke-land employed this mechanism for the study of magnetic phenomena and the aurora boreals, and he was able to reproduce with satemishing accuracy all the appearances and particularities of the natural phenomena.

" In 1919 he took up solly i light, the vast and diffused glow which conds agrees the solar world lying on the plan of an saliptic. This time the central globe of his apparatus, the 'terrella,' represented the oun, and became the centre for the emission of alectrons. Under these conditions a vast laminous ring spread out in the bell around the solar equator. At the same time one sould see on the central globe a double band of brilliant points whose distribution reminded one currously of the spots on the surface of the ann. In the course of these expariances with rediscal light Dr. Birkeland made an interesting discovery. By diminish and little by little the intensity of the dis sharge current that traversoil his apparatua he saw the large ring representing the mediacal glow draw itself in and narrow itself matil at formed around the equator of the 'terrella' a crown similar to the ring of Baturn, and formed, as that le, of several sense of different brilliafter."

PURPLE OVE FROM SHELLFISH.

On the Pacific most of Costa Rica, especially in the region about there has, there abounds a kind of shallfish called the " bacascol," from which a time purple solver is obesined. So far no way has been found for proserving this day, and the industry has remained in the hands of the few old people who bake the trouble to die a few ounces of throad every summer. The process is very simple. On picking up the shell from the beach or detaching it from a boulder, the matherer blows her breath into it, whereupon o few drops of a greenish liquor core out. This Monor is collected in a clam shell, and wher a sufficient quantity has been collected thread is passed through it. very soon essuming on exposure to the sunlight a beau-Mfsl purple colour, which is absolutely fast gather to has turned purple. It is thought posallie that the dre turns fast only on exposure to the air, and that the liquor could be preperval by beeping the air away from it.

WIRELESS DIRECTIONING AT SEA.

Finding direction at sea by means of wireless wares can now be effected with a large degree of accuracy, and is most useful during sea fogs when a vesse! has lost her way. saye the Nautical Magazine. The instrument suployed is the wireless direction-finder, which has a range up to about 300 miles and he not affected by conditions of weather. As & well known, in ordinary wireless telegraphy the receiving operator hears all the ships and more stations sanding out mesonger at that moment, without being able to differentiate between them. The direction-hader enables one to fix the direction of various positions in such a way that one is able to find the posi-Mon of the ship by means of angles from the wireless stations employed. Fixing position by directional wireless is very similar to figing by cross bearings from visible objects, the principal difference in .. that, when using a chart on Mercatur's me " allowance has So be made for the e of the earth. The wireless aint and . gonerally at very much greater distriber and the objects used in an ordinary cross burning fix. Although fixing position by wireless directional beartoge is dependent for its accuracy upon the segree of precision with which it is at present possible to determine the direction of wireless waves, subsequent confirmation of the course and distance made good, by the receipt of additional bearings, would afford confidence so those responsible in the vessel as the land is approached under weather conditions that preclude the employment of other methods.

TO MAKE WOOD ACID PROOF. Bome storage batteries are carried in wooden battery boxes on cars and annoy the owners by leaking or slopping of the acid. To make the wood seid proof take aix parts of wood tar and twelve parts resin, and melt them together in an iron kettle, after which stir in eight parts of finely powdered brick dust. The surface to be covered must be thoroughly cleaned and dried before painting

TAKING DOWN THE MOTOR.

In order to look over the parts of an engine and to restore the word or defective components it is necessary, says the Scientific American, to take the engine entirely apart, m it is only when the power plant is Choroughly dismantled that the parts can be impected or measured to determine defects or wear. If one is not familiar with the ciscine to be inspected, even though the work is done by a repairman of experience, it will be found of value to take certain precautions when dismandling the angine in order to maure that all will be replaced in the same position they occupied before remaral. There are a number of ways of ide at wag the parts, one of the simplest and one of thing to mark them with steel numbers or and re or with a series of contre punch marks in order to retain the proper relation when reassembling. This is of special importance in connection with dismantling multiple evinuler engines, as it is vital that pistons, piston rings, connecting rods, valves, and other cylinder parts be always replaced in the same cylinder from which they were removed, because it is uncommon to find equal depreciation in all cylinders. Some repairmen use small shipping tags to identify the pieces. This can be eriticised because the tags may become decached and lost and the identity of the piece mistaken. All parts should be thoroughly closmed with gasoline or in the potash kettle sa removed, and wiped clean and dry. TESTING

AND THE DAIRY INDUSTRY

Interesting Address at Glin (PROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)

At a meeting of the Glin Branch of the Farmers' Association, Mr David Ruddia pre-Mr English, of the DATI, delivered an in teresting address on cow sessing. He said the dairy industry had been the mein source of


income for the Irish farmers, and from what he could see should always remain so. They had in Ireland one and a half willion dairy cowe, the average yield of which was slightly over 400 gallons per cow per annum. This yield contrasted strongly with the yield obtained in other countries, such as Denmark, Holland, America, and Canada, where is varied from 750 to 900 gallons. America showed in no ineignificant manner the large strides which may be made in the development of the Irish dairy berds if only Irish dally formers would take the means and trouble, which trouble, he was glad to say, was now much simplified.
