





BISNOPS LIMERICK 15151 AND THE PEACE TREATY Superintendent's MEETING IN DUBLIN

Important Statement Issued The meeting of the Irish Hierarchy salied by Cardinal Logue in connection with the Peace Treaty was held in University College, Dabiln. As their Lordehlpe entered the building they were controused by a small army of camera mey, and the crowds of people who assembled in the visibility of Stephen's Green respectfully saluted as the dislinguished Prelates passed in. The following statement was spanimonsly agreed to te-

"The Bisbops of Ireland hold in the highest appreciation the patriotism, ability and housety of ourpose with which the Irish representatives have conducted the struggle for national freedom.

"Now, that Dal! Elreann have the responsibillty of deciding the deatiny of Ireland in the approaching deliberations, in the course of which they will be sure to have before their minds the best interests of the country, and the wishes of the people to whom they and we harpily belong, we most earnessly beg of God that they may be guided by wisdom from above, and implore the Divine blessing on sheir connaels.





In the Irish Free State soon, we hope, to be an accomplished fact, Iceland will have fall and free play for selling her products and buying ber necessaries wherever she pleases.

the new conditions, find Great Britain a very valuable market

The nearness of the two constries is a most Importants factor to be taken into account in this connection.

Basides, when Ireland is completely free to brade abroad Great Britsin will be more inslined to encourage trade between the two conneries, and a more favoarable system of sconomic exchange for Iceland will maturally arise.

England wants and will continue to want Irish produce and she will be ready, if necessary, to pay more for it when she knows that Ireland is no lorger exclusively dependent on her for a market.

Ireland in the other hand, owing to the proximity of the two countries, will, very probably, find Esgland a convenient seatre from which to purchase many of these requirements she will not be producing herself.

The volume of trads between the two countries, therefore, serms likely to increase rather then diminish.







VARIETY IN THE BARK OF THE DOG.

To a student of such mathens, the back of a dog can express even shade of emotion from joy to terror. There is the shallenging bark of a watchdog. To one who has bothered to make a study of it. a bark is as expressive of any of several emotions as is human speech, and is as easily classified. Learned scientists, Lubbook among them, have declared most solemnly that the bark of a deg is an effort at mutating human speech. They have backed this statement by proving shat wild dogs never bark, nor do such few domestic dogs as have been reared (by way of experiment) under conditions in which they have never heard the human voice. No unfamed branch of the dog family has a bark.
