

THE ERUPTION OF KATLA IN SMA

The voicano of Katia, situated some they hidometres south-west of lickle, was in violant preption in October, 1918, after mannaging quissionst eince the last provious eruption in 1800. A note by M. A. Loctors in the " Comptee Rendus" of the Parm Academy of desences, gives some account of the cruption. from data sent to him from Iceland. A listle after mon on the 12th a sight earthquake shock was followed by the uprising above the Myrdalsjukull of an enormous column of msandescent ashes visible throughout the island for 200 to 300 kilometres. At Revkjarik a mick fail of ash darkoned the whole sky, and a tidal wave was experienced on the coast south of the volcano. As is usual in Irchand, the paroxyen: was accompanied by violent glacier outbursts. The first visitor to the erater after the eruption was M. Pall Svenesson, whose notes have been placed at M Laeroix's disposal. Katha ites in the castsouth-nest of the Myrdalsjökull, one of the great neemasses of southern Icaland, and on is south-east ade extends the Myrdalsandur, a great desert of sand formed of the material deposited during the glacial outbursts. 122 the north-west and south-west the Myrdalajokall is surmounted by two domes of ice riging to heights of 1,500 to 1,600 metres. Besween them is a cup-shaped depression, at the bottom of which the crater of Katis opens. which M. Sveinsson ascended were covered with ashes to a depth of half a metre, and mose falling to the crater with half as much again. The rift of the crater, which measured from 500 to 800 by 40 metres, was free from ice, but water was flowing along it. No fumeroles nor products of sublimation were seen, only a vellowish brown mud, the lighter portions of which seem derived by alteration from the darker, heavier ash. The glacier forrents had opened two deep ravines towards the south and east, and had done considerable domage, carrying with them huge masses of see to a distance of thirty kilometres. The Mony debris had formed a vast promontory on the coast similar to that formed in 1860. Like the thirteen previously recorded emplicant, that of 1918 was exclusively explosive, with se outpouring of lava-a fact more remarkable from the vicinity of Katle to the scene of the great fissure eruption of 1783. A prelimimary analysis of the ash shows it to be rich in Manfum, a character common to the few ensamples yet analysed of the basaltie volcamis suchs of Iceland, the Faroes, and Greenland.


