

THERE is a feeling of very general disappointthe Out of Work Fund in Limerick, and great sympathy is naturally felt for the many civili ans and ex-soldiers who are disqualified for benefit under the 1021 Unampleyment Insurance Amendment Act.

By that Act, passed early this year, is was enacted that civilians who had done work in at least twenty weeks since first January, 1920, should be entitled to sixteen weeks' benefit of 15e per week for the period from July to November Sies, and the same for a like period for 1922 in the event of their being still unem

And by the same Act, ex-soldiers who could prove ten weeks' work for the same period were sutified to like benefit. And if they hap pened to be disabled and have disablement pensions or suffer disabilities that interfere with work the requirement as to ten weeks work since les January, 1930 can be dispensed with ; but this can only be done, according to the Section of the Act, if it was owing to disabilisy or something beyond the control of the individual that ten weeks' work could not be

Now, what has been the effect of this stringency of the Act ? Owing to what might be called the abnormal extent of unemployment layserly, many sivilians-hard-working men at all times-have been unable to show the requisite aumber of wants' work in 1920-21 Not having this quandestion, their applications cannot be entertained. The officials, who are bound by the terms of the Act, have to reject the applications, otherwise the sisims when they should reach the bead offices for coufirms. tion would be tarned down.

It may be eatd that ex-soldiers are in a worse plight. Very few of them in Limerick, and still fewer from outside districts, san show any work at all. The requit of this is that, unless they are disabled men, the Referes "Father" of the Chambre des Deputes; M Course have no power to resommend any benefit for them.
