COST OF LIVING

TRACING THE DECLINE

Mr H G Williams, A M I C E, who has for the past nine mouths asserted that the cost of living will by April ment fall to about 75 per cent above the pre-war level, at which figure it will remain emalonary for a considerable period, addressed she members of the Indus erial League and Council on the subject at Carton Hall, Westminster. His arguments were based on the data published each month in the "Labour Gazeste," although, as he was careful to explain, that information was true only on certain conditions, which did not fit the case for everyone, Is had so be borne in mind, he said, that any statements with regard to the change in the cost of living must relate to the change in maintaining a certain defined standard of family, based on information colleged by the C100 Board of Trade, was 374 6d, exclusive of expenditure on alcoholic drink and amusements. The amount was made up as follows :-Food 29s 6d, rest 6s, clothing 4s 64, fuel and lighting Ss, miscellaneous 1s 6d. Toe monthly figures which were published were based on an stempt to discover how much it would soat to provide the same quantity and quality of all the Items incided in the pre-war budges of the average family, assuming that the stendard of living remained analtered, that it was neither raised nor lowered, and that there was no increase in the quantity of one commodity to make up for the reduced quantity of amother. That assumption, declared Mr Williams, was one which until fairly recently had been diffiouls to realise. It was quite evident, for tostance, that the same standard could not be maintained in the eres of sugar, beenuss until rationing was ended in was impossible for similar quantities to be obtained. To-day, when the public could obtain as much sugar as it wanted, it happened to be the care that, owing to change of habits brought about by rationing, people were not consuming anything like as much ougar as they used to do. Similarly, the substitution of margarine for butter under the food rationing orders had brought about a line result. The actual effect of that was to make the expenditure less than would be the once if the essumptions alluded to could be realised. The strudard which cost \$7s 6d to maintain in July, 1914, cast 66; more on November 1, 1920. but since then there has been a decrease of 28; 11d. STEAM FOR THE SOIL

For some time certain growers of tomatoes, secumbers, and similar vegetables for the London market bave been injecting steam into the soil with a view to destroying cortain sessets and stogs. It is reported that the plan sworks very well for that purpose, but the operation brought to light an unexpected fact; namely, that the soil thus treated inpressed greatly in fertility, so greatly, in fact, that the ordinary amount of manure connot be used afterwards. This effect has mean explained as being due to the steriliession produced by the steam, which kills the phagocytes or protozos which in ordinary circomstances keep down the number of bacteria in the soil whose operations are beneficent in Barning organic nitrogen into a form suitable for plant food. ORIGIN OF FIORDS.

Erofestor John W. Gregory, Professor of Bleedogy, Glasgow, speaking at the Royal Inesistation on "Fiords and their Origin," stated that the coast of Norway from headfand to headland was only 1,700 miles, but folfowing up the floris the coast line was 12,000 miles. The flords were over 6,000ft. or M.000ff. in depth, Loch Morar, on the west soast of Scotland, was only eleven miles long, but over 1,000ft deep. If these flords were cheared of water one of the most notable Seatures would be the flatness of the floor. Mhough many of these floris were probably sensed by glacial action wearing out the basins, there were exceptions, and some shange other than ice formations had origimeted the floris. THE EMPTINESS OF SPACE.

When we speak of outer space, the space Between star and star, as being empty of matter, is is rather interesting to see exactly what we mean, says the Scientific American. We know from observations on the planets Shas light, in its passage across space to our worth, suffers hardly any absorption, and from this we can deduce conclusions respectling the density of such matter as exists in Botter space. If the degree of rarefaction in nuter space is, for example, in the neigh-Bourhood of the 100,000,000th part of an atmosphers, then the appearance of Jupiter, for instance, would be as if our atmosphere had twice its present capacity. So that such matter as exists must be in a much more carefied state. But, after all, these terms are only comparative. Suppose our atmosphere were allowed to expand up to the fimits of the visible universe, as far as the Milky Way, then its rarefaction would be buch that it would be quite impossible, by may optical means, to detect the presence of buy matter. Nevertheless, there would be bout 5,000 molecules per cubic contimetre Ehroughout apace.

IS THE SUN LOSING MASS!

The work of Einstein on the "Principle of Sslativity " shows that a body which radiates energy loses a portion of its mass depending on the energy radiated. It follows, says the Scientific American, that the sun, which con-Sinually radiates energy, is constantly losing mass. M. J. Bosler has calculated that the sun loses a mass equal to that of our earth in Shirty million years. If it be assumed that the mass thus lost is gravitational mass it follows abat the length of the year increases by six seconds in a million years, and that in the same time the mean longitude of the earth in effected in such a way as to produce a variagion of one-tenth of a year, i.e., a retardation of thirty-six days in the seasons. Such variasions are too minute to be observable. In stellar systems possessing a higher tempera-Sure the effect would be much more marked, for the energy radiated by a body varies as the fourth power of its absolute temperature. Mr, as M. Nordmann believes, there exist stars Baving a temperature six or seven times that our sun, their radiation is one or two thoumand times as intense. Thus, if the tempera-Sure of Algol is 13,800deg. (Nordmann) it is balculated that at the end of two thousand years the eclipses of Algol suffer a retardation of about twelve minutes.

GREENFLY PRODUCTIVITY.

Many and various have been the attempts of writers of fiction to show how life on the warth might cease to be, but probably no swriter bas pictured terrestrial life becoming gapidly destroyed by the familiar greenily or "green blight." Yet, under certain conditions, the last living thing on the surface of the earth might readily be a single aphia or greenfly. Resumur estimated that a single aphis could become the first parent of mearly 6,000,000,000 individuals during the flew weeks of its existence; while Huxley made a classic computation that the offspring of one ancestor at the end of ten generations would have produced a mass of organio matter equivalent to that of 500,000,000 of human beings each weighing 20st. - roughly, bulk about equal to that of one-Birird of the entire population of the globe! Buch calculations record the results of the uninterrupted breeding of only one greenfly. We have only to glance at the vast number af forms on one shoot of an infested rose aree, and to think of their reproductive possi-Belities.

TO BECOME APPAILED. If but for a single summer the greenfly had unlimited sway, there would not only be no plants of any kind; every particle of vegetasion would become converted into living for its food on the vegetable world either directly or indirectly, all animal life on the fand would in consequence quickly perish. Fortunately, there are many factors at work which prevent any such terrible incresse ever saking place a thunderstorm, the common house sparrow, the pretty black-and-red ladybird, beetles of various species, the larves of the beautiful lacewing flies, and still more as spose of the wasp-like hover-flies,

MINTS FOR THE HOME.

BY A PRACTICAL HOUSEWIFE.

TO CLEAN A BATH. Marks on enamelled baths are caused by the clotting of soap in hard water and the preparation of drops of water allowed to remain on the surface. If not sufficiently rinsed and dried after use a bath is sure to show these marks after a time. To remove the unsightliness dip a flannel moistened in pagaffia oil into salt and rub vigorously on the bath.
Then rines with plenty of hot water and dry.
If the marks are not of long standing they can be removed with salt alone, or with salt moistened with spirits of turpentine. Apply this to the bath when dry. Still another good cleanser is whiting mixed to a paste with water. Cover the surface of the enamel with this, and leave it to dry. Then rub off and polish with a soft cloth.

MAKE SLEEP A BUSINESS.

When you go to bed make a business of sleep. Whenever the nervous woman leels that she is losing her sleep, she will do well to drop every other consideration, and give herself to the task of reastablishing normal rest. While sleep itself is still a good deal of a mystery, we know this at least that the activity of the brain cells is in sleep largely reduced, and for the most part is occupied in absorbing nourishment from the blood, and so creating a new supply of energy for the waking hours. Whenever the nervous system has been subjected to a great strain, as in times of special auxiety, arising from such causes as sickness or death in the family, it is imperative that the nervous system should be allowed to make up for its exhaustion by long subsequent sleep.

THE KITCHEN PENDER

This may be avoided by brushing them over with extender black which when dry, will give a smooth dull black surface, which can be pel sure with binch lend in the same way as the grate loss may save much labour, the binck used being made up as follows: Mathylated spirits, and gril: enrion. black, threepennyworth; varush (shellae), two tablespoonfuls.

Stir into the spirit as much of the black as it will take up, and add the varnish bottle and cork tightly. The uncreatents can be obtained at any varmish shop.

Place the mixture in one half of the marrow, lay the other half over. Place in a dish or baking tin with a little stock, cover closely with another dish or tin, and bake till tender, usually about twenty minutes. Serve with thick gravy or apple sauce.




