TRACING THE DECLINE Mr H G Williams, A MICE, who has for the past nine months asserted that the cost of living will by April next fall to about 75 per cent above the pre-war level, at which figure it will remain stationary for a considerable period, addressed the members of the Industrial League and Council on the subject at Caxton Hall, Westminster. His arguments were based on the data published each month in the "Labour Gazette," although, as he pointed out, it is not certain conditions, which did not fit the case for everyone. It had to be borne in mind, he said, that any statements with regard to the change in the cost of living must relate to the change in maintaining a certain defined standard of living. The total present budget of an average family, based on information collected by the Board of Trade, was 87s 6d, exclusive of expenditure on alcoholic drink and amusements. The amount was made up as follows: - Food 35s 6d, rent 6s, clothing 5s 6d, fuel and lighting 8s, miscellaneous 13s 6d. The monthly figures which were published were based on an attempt to discover how much it would cost to provide the same quantity and quality of all the items included in the pre-war budget of the average family, assuming that the standard of living remained unaltered, that is, was neither raised nor lowered, and that there was no increase in the quantity of any commodity to make up for the reduced quantity of another. This assumption, declared Mr Williams, was one which could rarely be made in practice, and he said that it was quite evident, for instance, that the same standard could not be maintained in the case of sugar, because until rationing was ended it was impossible for similar quantities to be obtained. To-day, when the public could obtain as much sugar as it wanted, it happened to be the case that, owing to changes of habit brought about by rationing, people were not consuming anything like as much sugar as they used to do. Similarly, the substitution of margarine for butter under the rationing system had brought about a like result. The total cost of the present budget of the average family, he said, was 100s 0d, or 12s 6d more than the cost of the pre-war budget. The standard which cost 87s 6d to maintain in July, 1914, cost 88s more on November 1, 1920, but since then there has been a decrease of 28s 11d. With regard to the relationship of wholesale prices to retail prices, the general average appeared to be that a period of six months separated the effect of the former upon the latter.

HINTS FOR THE HOME

BY A PRACTICAL HOUSEWIFE.

TO CLEAN A BATH. Marks on enameled baths are caused by the clothing of soap in hard water and the evaporation of drops of water allowed to remain on the surface. It is not sufficiently rinsed and dried after use a bath is sure to show these marks after a time...

MAKE SLEEP A BUSINESS.

When you go to bed make a business of sleep. Whenever the nervous woman feels that she is losing her sleep, she will do well to drop every other consideration, and give herself to the task of re-establishing normal rest...

WASHING FLANNELS AND BLANKETS.

Flannels should be washed in lukewarm suds by simply lifting up and down, squeezing in the suds, and stripping through the hands. The philosophy of this process versus that of rubbing is that wool is provided with myriads of minute hairs, which, breaking into one another in the rubbing process, cause shrinkage...

RABBIT EX-CASUS WITH RICE.

Prepare a rabbit for the table by first trying the rabbit in a pan of water. This will remove all dirt and any traces of blood that remain. Into an earthenware pan put about two ounces of dripping, and fry in it four ounces of well-washed rice, and add a small quantity of butter. Put in three rice crackers cut into quarters, just cover the contents of the casserole with stock, and cook very gently for half an hour...

THE KITCHEN FENDER.

When steel-topped kitchen fenders become stained or rusty from long use, or neglect, a great deal of labour is involved in keeping them at all tidy looking. This may be avoided by brushing them over with a black lacquer, which when dry, will give a smooth and black finish, which can be polished with black wax in the same way as the grate. This may be made much labour, the black lacquer being made as follows: Methylated spirits, one gallon; carbon black, three-quarters of a pound; shellac, two table-spoonsful...

FISH SOUPS FOR INVALIDS.

Soups are of special service in the sick-room, since an invalid often has but little strength left to eat, and a person cannot do his own cooking. The most popular soups are derived from meat, but well-made fish soups need only to be heated to be ready for use. The various fish soups contain a large proportion of gelatin, and the gelatin is of great value in the nutrition of other food elements in a digestible form. The greatest objection to fish soups is the lack of flavour, but this objection should disappear when the soup is well made, since it is possible to produce a tasty soup when flavouring with herbs, such as leeks, onions, carrots, celery, and parsley, thyme, mace, cloves, bay leaf, and pepper, can be obtained.

Preparation requires the fish to be cleaned, and the stock to be prepared from the fish trimmings which are usually thrown away. The trimmings must be well washed, and it is most important that they shall be kept free from dirt. The fish for the soup can be cleaned by first cutting the head and tail from each portion of trimmings. If the trimmings are available, a cod's head is good material from which to make fish stock. It should be freed of its gills and well washed. It should be placed in the fish kettle and covered with water, and put on the fire to boil slowly for about two hours, or until it falls to pieces. The stock should be strained off and set aside for use.

STUFFED VEGETABLE MARROW.

One medium-sized marrow, a quarter of a pound of cooked meat, two or three boiled onions, a teaspoonful of dried sage, salt, pepper, two ounces of breadcrumbs, a little gravy. Peel the marrow, cut in two lengthwise, remove seeds, and fill for five minutes in salted water. Drain. Mix the meat and mix with the breadcrumbs, chopped onions, seasoning, and gravy. Place the mixture in one half of the marrow, lay the other half over. Place in a dish or baking tin with a little stock, cover closely with another dish or tin, and bake till tender, usually about twenty minutes. Serve with thick gravy or apple sauce.

IRISH RAILWAY WAGES

Mr W. Carrigan, K.C., in his award, which has been issued on the wages of Irish railway men, has ruled that the "cut" made by the railway companies in the majority of cases in the demarcation class, and has no more provision than the "A" rates (rates deemed to have been in force since 15th August, 1921, and on which the existing rates shall operate for fixing any award) shall be maintained with the cost of living, in proportion to the same amount in Great Britain, but has provided that the "B" rates (standard rates) shall be increased, and the increase which he has sanctioned represents a considerable improvement on the "B" rates formerly in force. The award applies to Transports, the various grades (assistant payers) as stationmasters, assistant stationmasters, goods agents, assistant goods agents, parcel carriers, assistant parcel carriers, and passenger conductors, and is retrospective.
