There were four executions at Cork Detention Barracks on Thursday morning. The executed men were Maurice Moore (24), Queenstown; Patrick Sullivan (23), do.; Patrick Romayne (24), Greenhill, Burnfort; Thomas Mulcahy (18), Fourteen, Burnfort. Maurice Moore and Patrick Sullivan were charged with others with committing an offence in that they, at Clonmurry, in the Co. Cork, on the 20th day of February, 1921, did, with other persons unknown, levy war against His Majesty by attacking with arms a detachment of His Majesty's forces.

HOW O'CONNELL COMMANDED AN AUDIENCE.

An incident in an historic election. A correspondent of "The Irish Times" gives the following interesting excerpt from the chapter headed "O'Connell's Election," in "Recollections of an Irish Police Magistrate," by Henry Robert Atkinson, published in 1862.

ANOTHER DUBLIN ARSENAL RAIDED.

The following official report was issued by Military Headquarters, Ireland, on Friday: Last night troops raided some stables at the back of 18 Pembroke road, and in a loft discovered 11 rifles, 52 revolvers, 11 shotguns, 13,000 rounds of revolver ammunition, 14,700 shotgun cartridges, 8,930 detonators, 49 rounds of Winchester ammunition, 18 boxes of various explosives, 59 tubes of ammonite, 1 heavy light pistol, 7 swords, 18 un-detonated bombs, 16 detonated bombs, 90 coils of fuse, 2 tins of aluminium, 1 bullet-making machine, 2 magnitos, 11 coils.
