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FARMING NOTES.

Potato-Spraying.

It is perhaps unnecessary to emphasize the necessity for spraying potato crops. The older generation of farmers still remember too keenly the recurring bad potato harvests due to "light" attacks which preceded the general adoption of the practice.

But while the initial victory has been won, there is still reason to think that maximum results are not being obtained through failure to perform the operation thoroughly, and to spray at least twice.

In applying the spray the object to be aimed at is to cover the exterior of the plant so thoroughly that not a single unprotected spot remains on which the seeds of the blight fungus may alight, germinate, and so enter the plant.

The crop reports issued by the Department during July and August of last year contain references to the belated commencement of spraying operations. It cannot be too strongly emphasized that to be effective, spraying must be done before disease appears.

The strength of the solution used for spraying is usually what is known as the 2 per cent. mixture—that is, 2 lb. copper sulphate (of 98 per cent. purity), 2 1/2 lbs. washing soda (also of 98 per cent. purity), to 10 gallons of water.

A CAHIR WILL CASE.

In King's Bench Court No. 2 on Friday last, before Mr. Justice Dodd and a City special jury, the probate action of Loohey and Hickey concluded with a verdict for the defendant.

The defendant was Michael Hickey, in whose house the testator died, who was named as executor, but who had no interest in the assets, which consisted in the main of a farm and 4786 in the bank. The will was drawn up by the Rev. E. J. Ryan, who was a relative of the testator.

Mr. Justice Dodd, in summing up, said that he wished to repeat what he had said before on many occasions, namely, that it was undesirable for clergymen of any church or creed to interfere in the making of wills. In making these remarks he did not wish to make any reflections upon the rev. gentleman who was concerned in this case.

FATE OF THREE OFFICERS NEAR CAHIR.

Evidence at Military Court.

The following has been communicated:— A military court of inquiry was held at Cahair respecting the deaths of Lieut. W. G. C. Glossop, R.F.A., aged twenty-one; Lieut. R. S. Battridge, R.F.A., aged twenty-one; and Second-Lieut. A. H. C. Tuogood, 1st Batt. Lincolnshire Regt., aged twenty.

Another witness stated that shots were heard at 3 a.m. on Monday morning near Woodroffe church, and some hours later the bodies of the three officers were found lying on the road.

A medical witness gave his opinion that the officers had not been dead for more than twelve hours, and that they had been shot where the bodies were found lying.

Waterford G.P.O. RAIDED. Shortly before three o'clock on Saturday last ten armed and undisguised men entered Waterford G.P.O. and held up the staff as well as those on the premises, including a letter carrier to the military barracks.

During the recent raid on Newbridge post-office stamps and money to the value of 500 were taken away. A number of registered letters were opened, according to the Castle report, and some documents destroyed.

R.I.C. SERGEANT SHOT AT MULLINAHONE.

On Saturday evening Sergt. Brady, Mullinahone, was fired at in Killinane and wounded in the face, shoulder, and leg. He was removed on Sunday to Tipperary military hospital. It is stated he was cycling on dispatch duty when wounded, and, although letters and documents he was carrying were taken, his revolver was not.

KILLED AT ROSKEE.

An official communication issued from Dublin Castle states:— Wm. Connolly, of Rossony, was killed as the result of an affair at Roskee, in the Borrisokane district, on Sunday. A police patrol guarding a vacant police barracks, challenged a number of men. They failed to halt, and fire was opened upon them. Later in the day Connolly was found dead in a house in the neighbourhood. It is presumed he died as the result of wounds.

LABOURER KILLED IN LIMERICK.

Four Persons Wounded.

A Limerick correspondent says:— After a very quiet week in Limerick the people who were out for a walk in the cool of Saturday evening were startled by the report of firearms in the neighbourhood of Patrick street and Arthur's quay. A Constabulary patrol, numbering eight armed men, was going from William street police barracks, over Sunfield bridge, when shots were fired from the Arthur way direction.

Another witness stated that shots were heard at 3 a.m. on Monday morning near Woodroffe church, and some hours later the bodies of the three officers were found lying on the road.

At a Field General Court-martial at Cork, on Tuesday, Kate Crowley, Midge Cotter, and Lily Cotter of Carrigrohilly, were charged with the attempted murder of an Army officer and soldier between Windsor Cottage and Ballinacree on June 23rd, in that they, by the explosion of gunpowder, destroyed or damaged portion of a road, with intent to murder a lieutenant, and private of the 2nd Batt. South Staffordshire Regt.

ALLEGED ATTEMPTED MURDER.

Three Women Court-martialed in Cork.

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Encounter in Mayo. Civilian Killed. Three I.R.A. Officers Captured. An R.I.C. patrol was ambushed at 5.45 on Sunday by a party of armed men at Cylagh, in the Ballycastle district of Co. Mayo. The police took cover, engaged the attackers with rifle fire, and five armed rebels, three of whom are officers in the I.R.A., were captured. One who was killed by the police has been identified as Thomas Nealon, of Aughlosse. The police captured a number of arms, a large quantity of ammunition, and a number of important documents. There were no casualties to the police.
