OUR COUNTRY COLUMN FOOT & MOUTH DISEASE IN IRELAND.

POTATOES FOR GARDENS AND ALLOTMENTS.

For some years past a disease known as Black Scab has been causing much loss and inconvenience to potato growers in a limited area in the North-East of Ireland.

Certain varieties of potatoes, such as, for example, Epicure, British Queen, Up-to-Date, and Arran Chief, are susceptible to the disease, and experience has shown that the disease is most commonly spread by means of seed of susceptible varieties from crops grown on infected land.

EARLIES. - A remarkably heavy yield was obtained in last year's trials with the variety 'Earlies' on a total yield of 17 1/2 tons per statute acre.

EARLY. - A late first-early or early mid-season variety, the tubers are purple in colour, round in shape, and of good quality.

ARRAN CHIEF. - A variety extensively grown in Great Britain last year. The tubers are white in colour, kidney in shape, and of good cooking quality.

ARRAN VARIETY. - The tubers of this variety are very close resembling those of Black Scab, and of excellent cooking quality.

MAJESTIC. - An early maincrop variety, white in colour, oval to long in shape. They grow very large, but are not very numerous.

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As announced on the 19th inst., the Department regret to say that an outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease has been confirmed on a farm in the County Wicklow, about two miles from Arklow.

The Department, as already notified, at once took the necessary steps to combat the disease. The infected farm has been placed under absolute prohibition; the immediate slaughter of the animals affected, 14 in number, has been ordered, as well as that of those animals which, though showing no signs of the disease, were in virtual contact with them.

It is of the utmost importance that owners of livestock, and the public generally, should realise that those measures directed in the interests of the livestock and cattle trade of the country with a view to the speediest eradication of the disease.

The Ministry have for the time being, following the established procedure, placed an embargo against landings of all classes of livestock from Ireland at British ports save for the purpose of slaughter at the ports of Dublin and Waterford.

The Department hope to obtain early modification of these restrictions as soon as they can report that the outbreak has been successfully confined to the place now affected.

Owners should carefully inspect their cattle at frequent intervals, and if symptoms in any way suggestive of foot-and-mouth disease are observed, they should immediately report to the Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority.

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CO. LIMERICK FARMERS' ASSOCIATION.

A special meeting of the Executive of the Co. Limerick Farmers' Association was held at Garry's Hotel, Limerick, on Saturday, 15th inst., Mr. M. Sheehy, Shannongrove, Pallankey, presiding.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed. The correspondence was of a lengthy character and was dealt with in detail.

The case of the unpurchased tenants in the county was under discussion for a considerable time, and it was decided to summon all those tenants or their representatives, to the special meeting on the 25th inst., in order that concerted action might be taken.

The free importation of Canadian cattle was discussed at considerable length, and it was decided to request our National Executive to give prominence to the question at the Farmers' Congress in Dublin.

The contractors to the Farmers' Association in Co. Limerick were brought under the notice of the meeting and the General Secretary, Mr. Walsh, was directed to send out cards of membership to all the branches who have sent in their receipt books for audit.

A meeting of the committee of the above branch was held in the Cappamore Co-operative Creamery on Thursday, 13th inst., Mr. C. Ryan, Tower Hill, presiding.

The chairman addressed the meeting on the necessity of union amongst farmers. He mentioned that all holdings should be combined for their own protection.

The future outlook for the Irish farmer was not a rosy one and they could not expect other people to help them. Their brains were not by any means as large as it should be, and they were faced with difficulties it would be well to overcome.

The organisers went into detail on what the Farmers' Union had accomplished during the past few years, and said he was very pleased to compliment Mr. Ryan on the deep interest he had shown in the progress of their Association.

UNEMPLOYMENT ON MAIL BOAT.

In Dublin on Thursday eight young men were brought before a Field General Court-martial, charged with being about to board the R.M.S. Minister for England on October 25th in possession of uniforms of the Irish Army.

DUBLIN TRIALS ADJOURNED.

Owing to the informality in connection with the furnishing of the summary of evidence to the prisoners in the case in which four men are charged in reference to the shooting of Capt. G. T. Baggally, a court-martial officer in Beggart Street, on Sunday, Thursday 21st, the trial court-martial on Monday was adjourned till five o'clock on Tuesday (Friday). It was decided that at the conclusion of that case, the trial of the Lieut. Anglin case should be resumed.

GABINET AND GENERAL STRICKLAND.

These brought several persons, including bankers, shopkeepers' sons, and others who were passing by, to the bridge, where they had to point with lime or white paint inscriptions such as "God Save the King," "God Bless the Black and Tans," and "Up the R.I.C." The hearing being accomplished, the persons were allowed to depart. Subsequently the men left the scene, and the people were left in the streets.
